Get legal advice as early as possible -Legal Aid can help you find a lawyer.



It's important to attend all the appointments and meetings. If you can't make it, call the caseworker and reschedule.







You have the right to have the Department clearly explain the reasons your child has been removed and exactly what you need to do to have your child returned to your care. Ask for this in writing.



It can help to write down what you would like to say before a conversation – especially if you are upset.



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•Keep a copy of all the communication that happens between you and the Department. Keep emails, letters and phone records. Write down what was said in conversations. Ask caseworkers to send you an email copy of what they have said.



Ask for contact with your child ASAP.

Tell caseworker you want to be involved in decisions about your child

"When my son was removed...I was vengeful and very, very, angry, and I hated FACS and I was just hell-bent on proving them wrong... I went to the group for parents with kids in care and it really helped me, I suppose realising where I went wrong and learning how to work with FACS, learning how to communicate with them in a healthy manner Isuppose" It is also OK for you to ask for this person to speak on your behalf if you are feeling very upset – you can also ask to take a break during a meeting or call back if you are on the phone.



It is ok to take a support person with you when meeting with caseworkers. This can be a worker, a friend or anyone you trust.
